

he land on which the City of Glendale is located was a Spanish land grant that bordered the boundaries of the San Fernando Mission to the North and those of the

San Gabriel Mission to the East. This grant was awarded to a Spanish soldier named Jose Maria Verdugo in 1784 with the condition that he farm the land and raise livestock and live peace- fully with the American Indians. Don Jose Verdugo died in 1831 but his name and legacy will long endure with parks, mountains and roads all named Verdugo.

The Verdugo Adobe is the last remaining remnant of that historic family and the era in which it thrived. It is nestled in the rustic and quiet Verdugo Woodlands and was built by Teodoro Verdugo, grandson of Don Jose Maria Vedugo and thought to have been built in 1828. It was on this site on January 11,1847, representatives of the Mexican Army, General Andres Pico and U.S. Army, Col John C. Fremont met under a large oak tree, now known as

the "Oak of Peace" to discuss details of a peaceful completion of the war between the Americans and the Californios (people of Mexican descent living in California) That meeting led to a treaty only days later which ended the fighting and set in motion the aroundwork for California statehood in 1850. Unfortunately the mighty historic oak



died of natural causes in 1987 but a marker and a portion of that grand tree still remain to mark its location If you stand by the stump of that historic oak and look toward the Verdugo Adobe you can almost imagine the negotiators, the war weary soldiers and their horses on that cold historic date and time.

When the adobe was built and what was on this land during that historic meeting is up for much speculation. It is hard to believe that this area was such a large part in California's history and since the Verdugo family owned this land at that time, what part they played. Today the adobe still remains in a peaceful setting

with oak trees and other foliage ideal for family outings with tables for a picnic lunch.



The Verdugo Adobe is now owned by the City of Glendale, and group tours are available to view the Verdugo Adobe Museum which was furnished and is maintained by the members of the Days of the Verdugos Heritage Association.



We invite you to step back in time to an earlier, more challenging era of warm hearths, rustic furniture and skilled artisans at Glendale's Historic Vedugo Adobe.



The adobe itself is now a living museum that has been authentically furnished with much attention to reflect the furnishings of that era and the Verdugo family that lived here in the 1860's.
